Before School Routines

All students are to wait at the hall before school. Parents are able to wait at the hall also. NAPLAN 2021

Information will go out on Monday to all families of students in Years 3 and 5. Norris Road Students will sit NAPLAN in its online format this year following our very successful trial of it in 2019.

Pritchard Place Parking

I have again tried to contact the Council regarding proposed changes to Pritchard Place, but am yet to lock in another meeting time. Councillor Landers and I have spoken, but the details of the proposed work is still to be finalised.

With this in mind, I urge all of you who use that space to follow the traffic regulations. 3-point turns in front of other cars is inappropriate and can endanger and antagonise others. We don't need this.

AEDC Data collection

The Australian Early Development Census (AEDC) is a population-based measure of how children have developed by the time they start school. It looks at five areas of early childhood development: physical health and wellbeing, social competence, emotional maturity, language and cognitive skills (school-based), and communication skills and general knowledge. The last census was completed in 2018. Norris Road Prep Teachers will be involved in completing this data gathering later this year. More information will be provided to Prep families as it is provided to the school.

Point for Reflection

The words "equity" and "equal" are sometimes used interchangeably. "Equal" means the same – perhaps in terms of quantity, degree or value – whereas "equity" when viewed through the lens of education is unequal treatment of some learners to ensure every learner has an equal chance for success. When operationalised within a school, this looks like different groups of students receiving different support and different resources. It is the capacity of school leaders to apply human and financial resources based upon need which enables equity of outcomes for students. (Leslie Single – QASSP)

If you have booked an appointment on another day, these appointments will be held in your child's classroom.

Students need to be present at the meeting with teachers and parents as they will have a role to play in the discussion around their learning and achievements and in particular their goals. The opportunity will empower our students to assume increasing responsibility for their learning. Meetings will be conducted face to face in the School Hall and are of 15 minutes' duration.

COVID 19 Restrictions

In previous years we have provided seating in the hall for parents to wait quietly for their meetings. This year **all parents will wait outside** the hall in front of the library and when the buzzer is sounded move into the hall to the teacher. Those parents in meetings will be asked to leave the hall on the other side when the buzzer is sounded. To co-ordinate the meetings we have employed an online booking system to assist parents in securing their preferred times. The procedure is as follows:

• If you wish to see any of your children's teachers, you need to secure an appointment time using this system. If you do not have access to the internet you can call the school office or see your child's teacher and they will be able to assist you to access the program and make your bookings.

• <u>The booking system will only be accessible from 12:00am, Monday 15.03.2021 through to 12:00pm, Saturday</u> <u>27.3.2021.</u> No interview requests will be accepted outside of these times on the system.

• In your web browser type in the school website <u>https://norrisroadss.eq.edu.au/Pages/default.aspx</u> and when this appears click the link for 'Parent-Teacher-Interviews' in the quick links section on the right hand side of the front page. This will take you directly to the booking site for our school.



NAPLAN

The 11th –21st of May marks the dates for students to sit the NAPLAN (National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy) tests. NAPLAN is an annual assessment for students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 and is point in time test used to provide a whole year level picture of progress in the domains of literacy and numeracy.

NAPLAN captures student performance in these tests on the selected days, using online means.

To help familiarise our students with the NAPLAN Online environment, your child's class will participate in a **practice** 'omnibus test' which will give students a chance to engage with the NAPLAN Online Platform.

- No identifiable data will be stored (student names will not be recorded)
 - No reports will be distributed to students or to the school

Attached is some further information about the NAPLAN tests. You can also access the public demonstration site here: <u>https://nap.edu.au/online-assessment/public-demonstration-site</u>. Students, teachers and parents are invited to use the public demonstration tests to familiarise themselves with the type of questions and related functionalities available in the NAPLAN Online assessment. The links at the bottom of the webpage take you to demonstration tests for conventions of language (grammar, punctuation, and spelling), numeracy, reading and writing for each NAPLAN test year level: 3, 5, 7 and 9. As all Year 3 students will complete the writing test on paper, there is no Year 3 demonstration test for writing.

Some of the key features include a range of question types, onscreen tools, timers and interactive navigation.

YEAR 3 SCIENCE INCURSION

On Monday the 15th of March, Year 3 participated in a Science incursion. Brett from Big Bang put on an exciting Science show that explained the differences between a solid, liquid and gas and how to heat up different materials.

Throughout the day, each class returned to complete some hands-on activities to help them develop their understanding of how heat energy transfers to cooler objects. Students measured the temperature of different objects in a variety of different locations and discussed why they were hotter or colder than other objects. Students were set the task of either melting or saving an ice cube using a tea towel, water bath or specific location. Lastly, students experimented with heat sensitive boards that changed colour when the student's body heat was transferred to the board. They then transferred the heat energy from the board into an ice cube.

The Write Stuff at NRSS

Teresa McLucas – Writing Coach



This term I have been working with our amazing Year 3 and Year 5 teams. The students have been working on building stamina for writing, planning for writing, developing text structure, vocabulary, sentence structure and punctuation. Our teachers are using work samples to identify writing goals and create groups for guided writing

At Norris Road, we include four approaches to writing to provide students with a balanced writing programme. These approaches spread across the gradual release model (I do, We do, You do), starting with a high level of support and finishing with students completing new learning tasks independently.

Modelled writing – 'Watch me and notice what I am doing as I tell you what's going on in my head'. In this teacher-led approach, the teacher is explicitly teaching the knowledge and skills needed during writing. The teacher uses the 'think aloud' strategy to explain steps and decision

making during the writing process.

Shared writing – '*I've shown you how I do it – now let's do it together*'. During this approach, the teacher and students work together to joint construct a piece of writing. The teacher often composes the text with assistance from the students. As the teacher drives the writing, students contribute ideas, provide alternatives to words or phrases and offer suggestions for improvement during revising and recrafting.

Guided writing – '*Have a go by yourself, but I will be here to guide you*'. In a guided writing group, students work on their writing task with guided support from the teacher. This pedagogy provides an opportunity for students to receive direct feedback as 'just in time, just-for-me information' that relates directly to their specific writing goal.

Independent writing – '*Now you can write independently with support and feedback from others*'. Students complete writing tasks independently with opportunities for feedback from teacher and peers.

Celebrating Student Writing

Our Year 3 students have been using a short Quick Write to demonstrate their writing skills and work on writing goals. Students were asked to write about things they hear, see, feel and wonder during a particular experience. Over the past two weeks we have been on a virtual tour of Australia Zoo and had a quick snorkel on The Great Barrier Reef.
